Team SWATI

SWATI is an association of dedicated development activists, experienced and expert workers, professionals and intellectuals.

The General Body and the Governing Body of the Organisation have Development Professionals and Activists with representation from different social groups and partner communities.

More than 90% of the working staffs and 50% of the executive members are from local community. Furthermore, more than 50% of staffs and 35% of executive members are women.

Target Groups:

SWATI has reinforced to continue the engagement with most vulnerable communities in both rural and urban locations, experiencing shortages of food and having the most difficulty to build a sustainable livelihood such as SCs & STs, landless, marginal and small farmers, poor women, transgender, migrants, physically challenged and children to meet the strategic objectives. Special effort shall be made to reach the Particularly Vulnerable Tribal Groups (PVTG) Communities

Approach of SWATI:

The approach of SWATI that includes action, reflection, replication and influencing involves its engagement with variables at different levels including stakeholder interest and relationships, relevant policies and legislations, socio-economic and socio-political conditions, environmental conditions.

SWATI not only works with the community at the grassroots but also builds the capacities of other likeminded organizations. It is known for complementing and supplementing the work of state government for a larger impact of the mainstream development programmes.

Livelihoods Intervention of the organisation encompasses promotion of optimal use of local resources, raising production and productivities of the existing livelihoods portfolios, skill building and handholding support for diversification and encouraging entrepreneurship among the marginalized sections of the community.



Odisha Millet Mission

To Strengthen the Food and Nutrition Security of Tribal and Rural Poor

Objectives of the Project

The main objectives of this Project

- To revive millets in rain fed farming systems and household consumption

- To Increase household consumption of millets by about 25% to enhance household nutrition security,

- To improve productivity of millets crops and make them profitability

- To promote millet processing enterprises at Gram Panchayats and Block Level

- To develop millets enterprises and establishing market linkages to urban/rural markets with focus on women entrepreneurs.



SWATI has been implementing this programme in 12 grampanchayats of Raikia block since 2017 and in all 12 Gram panchayats of Tikabali block from 2022 in Kandhamal district

Impact of the Project

This initiative has revived the millet crop in the farmer's field and also millet recipes in food plates.

The procurement support by the government has helped the farmers to get the reasonable price of their crops and it has created interest among the farmers to cultivate millet crop in more land. This procurement process has also assured the farmer to get proper price through bank transaction and without any mediator intervention.

The scientific methods of millet cropping like Systematic Millet Intensification method, Line transplantation, Line sowing etc have increased the production quantity and the trust of the farmers has been strengthened.

All the Millet farmers have produced 30 percent more crops in SMI farming system related to their traditional farming practice and more farmers are interested to cultivate this crop in coming season.

This year, when the production of other crops like paddy and pulses have decreased due to the effects of weather, this Millet crops have produced more and compensated the farmers for crop losses.

This process has also revived the traditional mixed cropping practice among the farmers. They have cultivated it with other traditional crops and got crop protection through this practice.

The fallow lands are converted to millet farm lands and it has generated more income and production. Farmers have realized that millet farming is more profitable with less input and more reliable in crises period.

The revival of millet crops has brought returns the nutrition varieties in their food recipes and created encouragement among the women. The women members are influenced by food festivals and taking interest to make different millet recipes at home.



Special programme for promotion of integrated farming

Aims and Objectives of the Project

SPPIF is focused on integration of different production systems such as Agriculture, Horticulture, Livestock, Fisheries, Agro forestry through integration of different schemes. The aim of the project is to increase the income level and to provide the livelihood and food security to the poor tribal families. The objectives are Optimum utilization of available natural resources with principles of Reduce, Recycle, Reuse & Recovery, Promotion of site specific and landscape-based farming systems through diversification, intensification, and integration in cluster approach and to improve livelihoods and income of farmers through enterprises, marketing, and

Impact of the Project

This program has encouraged the farmers to adopt integrated farming to increase their income. As the farmers are supported for integrated farming, they are able to increase their income through improved systems of vegetable farming, poultry and goat rearing and fish farming.

The application of new technical methods like trellis and bio-farming practice has supported the farmers to increase their production with low investment. Due to implementation of trellis in vegetable cultivation the villagers' dependency on forest for tree branches has reduced.

They have become capable in improved agriculture, animal husbandry and fish farming through the trainings and orientations.

This process has motivated the youth mass to earn a good income from farming practice and now many youth farmers are showing interest on farming.

The cluster based approach in agriculture has enhanced the production and marketing opportunity of the products.





Mukhyamantri Janajati Jeevika Mission (MMJJM)

Goal and Objectives of the Project

Enhancing household income of the Tribal Households in Odisha through farm, off-farm and non-farm initiatives focusing on regenerative Livelihood practices by working with the community institutions in all the Tribal areas of the state.

Promote holistic growth of Agriculture & Horticulture sector, through area based regionally differentiated strategies, which includes technology promotion, extension, post-harvest management, processing and marketing, in consonance with comparative advantage of each region and its diverse agro-ecological features;

Promotion of Livestock and fisheries clusters to get multi-functional outputs like nutritive rich food and helps in supplementing family incomes vis à-vis contribution to socio-cultural and livelihood security.

Promotion of Income Generating Activities for the poor and vulnerable households who can't be made part of any clusters will be supported for taking up various Income Generating Activities at the individual household level.

Promotion of forest-based livelihoods with necessary value addition for better supplementary income to the Tribal.

Encourage collectivization of beneficiaries into community institutions to bring economy of scale and to take care of their product aggregation, processing, value addition, social, economic need including marketing etc.

Farmer Producer Organisation

Goal and Objectives of the Program

To enhance productivity through efficient, cost-effective and sustainable resource use and realize higher returns for their produce, through collective action, to create an enabling policy environment for investment in Farmers Producer Organisations and to leverage their Collective Marketing Power SWATI has promoted five Farmer Producer Organisation(FPO) in its working area.

The FPOs are

Surgabhata Farmer Producer Organisation Ltd. at Tumudibandha,

Raikia Farmer Producer Organisation Ltd. at Raikia,

Gadabisara Farmer Producer Organisation Ltd. at G.Udayagiri,

Udyogi Farmer Producer Organisation Ltd. at Gutingia, Tikabali and

Hatishala Farmer Producer Organisation Ltd. at K,Nuagaon of Kandhamal district.



Impact

The FPOs have started procuring agricultural products from farmers and selling in larger market for better profit. They are also participating in different state and district level exhibitions to sale and exhibit their products.

Project Highlights

The Raikia FPO of Raikia has procured 967 quintals of Ragi in the area in Government Procurement Policy and MSP. It has also established famers support centers and processing units at panchayat level. The FPO also established two organic manure production centers to support the farmers in organic farming.

The Udyogi FPO of Tikabali has procured 552 quintals of Ragi from the farmers in Kainjhar, Burbinaju and Paburia Collection Centre.

The Raikia FPO has organized the farmers for integrated farming in 50 Villages.

Regular meetings have been held with the FPO members and various issues like membership fee collection, Minimum support price of different products, crop insurance, registration in government farmer's portal are discussed.

The FPO members are capacitated through training and orientations on Company management, Book keeping, Marketing and packaging methods. The FPOs are also linked with different marketing agencies and financial institutions for financial support and marketing knowledge.

Surgabhatta FPO of Tumudibandha has procured different agricultural products and fruits like mango and Banana and marketed in better price.

The FPOs have encouraged the farmers to cultivate in scientific methods like SRI Paddy cultivation, SMI millet cultivation, Line sowing and transplanting method, Trellis method, integrated farming, mixed cropping and organic farming method.

Impact

The FPOs are informing the farmers on market rates, marketing strategies, processing and packaging techniques etc regularly. It is also organising orientation camps and interface programmes with agricultural officers, Bank officials and marketing agencies for farmers knowledge sharing.





Strengthening of Livestock and Animal Husbandry Program delivery

Health Program of SWATI has evolved over the years as an important anchorage of its engagement with the community. During the initial years of Organization, it was confined to sensitization and awareness building and now it holds significance on account of its outreach and diversity. SWATI has been implementing numbers of programmes with the support of State and Central government's Health department and non-governmental organizations to address the health needs of the area. At present it is implementing Maternity Waiting Home, Targeted Intervention Programme, Promote right for Adolescent & Children on Develop initiative programme, Mental Health, Delivery Van and Bike Ambulance.



Maternity waiting Home (MAA GRUHA)

It is a temporary home for expectant mothers where they can wait for safe delivery preferably 7 -10 days before EDD. On onset of labour, they are to be shifted to nearby health facility having at least Basic Emergency Obstetric Care facilities for delivery.

Establishment of Maternity waiting homes in remote and inaccessible areas has been one of the initiatives designed under National Health Mission to increase institutional delivery so that maternal mortality as well as Neo Natal Mortality could be reduced. Maternity Home not only provides accommodation facility to the pregnant mother days before the expected date of delivery but also health care services by trained health professionals and includes provisions of nutritious food for the pregnant mothers.

SWATI has been managing three maternity waiting Homes at Balandapada of Phiringia Block, Katringia of K.Nuagaon Block and at Tikabali of Tikabali block with the support of National Health Mission of Government of Odisha. The outreach area of these Maternity homes covers above 30 Gram panchayats of three blocks.

Project Objectives

To establish alternative support infrastructure for addressing communication problems in difficult and inaccessible pockets for ensuring institutional delivery, to increase institutional delivery in the difficult and inaccessible pockets ultimately minimizing maternal & newborn mortality & morbidity, to change Knowledge, Attitude & Practice of rural people towards Maternal and Child Health care and to ensure 100% Institutional Delivery in remote and inaccessible pockets.

This year Total 1127 expectant mothers have admitted in three Maternity Home have admitted and stayed on an average of 9 days.

Total 947 Pregnant women have Institutional Delivery, 1012 have Normal Delivery and 57 have Cesarean Delivery.

To provide Food and nutrition security to pregnant mothers and lactating mothers the MWHs have facilitated to promote of nutrition gardens in villages. 85 families under Balandapada MWH 73 families under Katringia and 72 families under Tikabali MWH have promoted Nutrition Gardens.

To aware the villagers on message of different National and International Days the centers had observed Republic Day, International Women's Day, World AIDs Day, World Mother Day, International Yoga Day, Independence Day and Gandhi Jayanti in centers.



The centers have also observed World Breast feeding Week, National Nutrition week, newborn care week and National girl child week.

The Centers have organized Mothers convention, Village discussions on Mother and Child health and food and nutrition camps in village level to enhance the awareness of the villagers on Mother and child care maintaining the COVID guideline.

The workers of Maa Gruha Centers have regularly attended ASHA sector meetings, ICDS sector meetings, CEC Review meetings and VHND camps in their covering villages.

During this year different health officials like the Medical Officers, Block health officials, District health officials, NHM officials and local PRI members have visited MWHs in different occasions.



Impact of the Program

Maternal mortality and Neo Natal Mortality has reduced 90% and Institutional delivery and referral cases have increased to 92%.

This programme has created confidence among pregnant mothers on institutional delivery and increased their awareness level on pregnancy care and Neonatal care. It has also created awareness on medical facilities and government provisions on delivery among the villagers.

The responsibility holders of the Maternity waiting Home have been able to build rapport with the government duty bearers (Doctor, Staff, Nurse, ANMs), grassroots health service providers (ASHA, AWWs) and the Community, Panchayatiraj Representatives and leaders of the CBOs like SHGs & GKSs, The Coordinator and the Attendants participate in ICDS sector meetings, ASHA sector meetings and VHND sessions.

It has given motivation to the villagers for not to believe blind beliefs, not to perform unhealthy rituals and not to depend on traditional healers and quacks for disease or delivery practice. This programme has also activated the village level health institutions, Anganawadi centers and Gaon Kalyana Samiti activities.

Assistance for raising nutritional garden has helped the pregnant mothers to consume nutritional foods during pregnancy and lactation period.





Aim and Objectives of the Program

Targeted interventions are aimed at offering prevention and care services to high risk populations (Female Sex Workers- FSW, Male having Sex with Male- MSM and Injecting Drug Users- IDUs) within communities by providing them with the information, means and skills they need to minimize HIV transmission and improving their access to care, support and treatment services.

Impact

The project has created an impressive impact towards checking the STI/HIV & AIDS infections in High Risk Behaviour Groups and the general population. It has created awareness and practice for Adoption of safe sexual practice measured in terms of increase in use of condom, increased understanding on the ways of that infection spreads, facilitated to accessing clinical health services and taken measures to reduce risk level from high to low.

Due to this intervention 90% people know their status by diagnosis, 95% of people with HIV diagnosed and receive ART, 90% those of ART supersede viral load by 2024.



Delivery Van Service

Objective of the Program

To ensure the Institutional Delivery of the Pregnant Mothers in inaccessible areas of Kandhamal district and to provide Ambulance facility at the door step the district administration made facilities of special delivery vans equipped with all the facilities for safe delivery. The van is equipped with all necessary instrument and equipments required for normal delivery, water facility, delivery table etc. with two SAB trained Staff Nurses to manage the cases. There are also two attendants and two drivers in each Delivery van to meet all the emergency Cases.

SWATI is managing Delivery Van services in four PHC areas namely Phiringia, Sarangada, Indragada and Belghara with the support of National Health Mission, Kandhamal.

During this year above 1000 pregnant women and 40 post natal care cases have got service facility through delivery Van. Out of them 122 critical cases have onboard delivery in the Van and other 43 cases were transfer to district medical.

Bike Ambulance GARUDA

To solve the Delivery issues and to check the high rate of IMR & MMR in the district the Kandhamal district administration has been implementing different innovative programs like Delivery Van service, Bike ambulance and Janani Auto service since 2018.



A bike fixed with a trolley is designed as Bike ambulance to carry the pregnant women from inaccessible villages to health centre. This Bike Ambulance service By SWATI is covering 73 village and 3078 household of 4 panchayats of Phiringia block namely Sadingia, Panga, Sumarabandha and providing service to the villagers in free. This service is supporting in transportation of pregnant mothers and reducing the percentage of IMMR and MMR in the remote villages. This is also engaging in transporting sick persons/newborn children up to 5 year and emergency health care.

Total 87 pregnant women and 15 other cases have been transported through Bike Ambulance for health service. This uninterrupted ambulance service has provided a big assurance and support to the villagers of inaccessible pockets in Phiringia block of Kandhamal district .

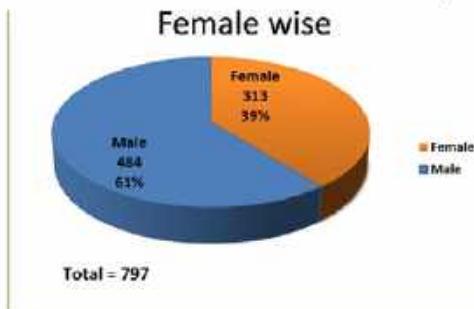
Process of Implementation

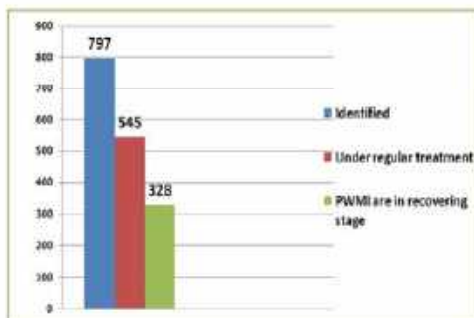
Out of 797 identified PWMI 545 persons are under regular treatment and 328 are in recovering stage.

105 recovered PWMI are given Direct Livelihood support to start some income generation activities and other 101 are linked with different sources.

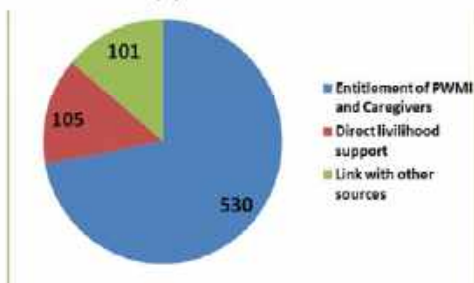
All the Recovered PWMI, caregivers and community members are oriented on Psycho-Social re-integration Education to support the PWMI to re-integrate in the Community.

Women Empowerment for Gender Mainstreaming has been a major focused area of SWATI's Intervention. SWATI addresses both practical and strategic gender needs in its community development initiatives making it a cross-cutting issue across all the programmatic interventions of the Organization. Issues and concerns of the women are factored into all the sectoral interventions through a concerted effort to enhancing women's participation. SWATI has genderized its personnel policy, formulated workplace policy and formed Committee against sexual harassment. Women component analysis has been integrated into all the tools and techniques of the planning, monitoring and evaluation devised by the organization.



Empowering Women through Legal Literacy campaign

The Project entitled “Empowering Women through Legal Literacy campaign in Odisha” aimed to address different challenges related to entrenched Gender Biases, Lack of Legal Awareness, and Systemic Barriers continued to impede women's full integration and empowerment. This initiative was conceptualized to Empower Women through targeted interventions focused on Legal Literacy, Peer Support, Publication Dissemination, and Institutional Coordination.

SWATI is implementing this project in all the thirty districts of Odisha

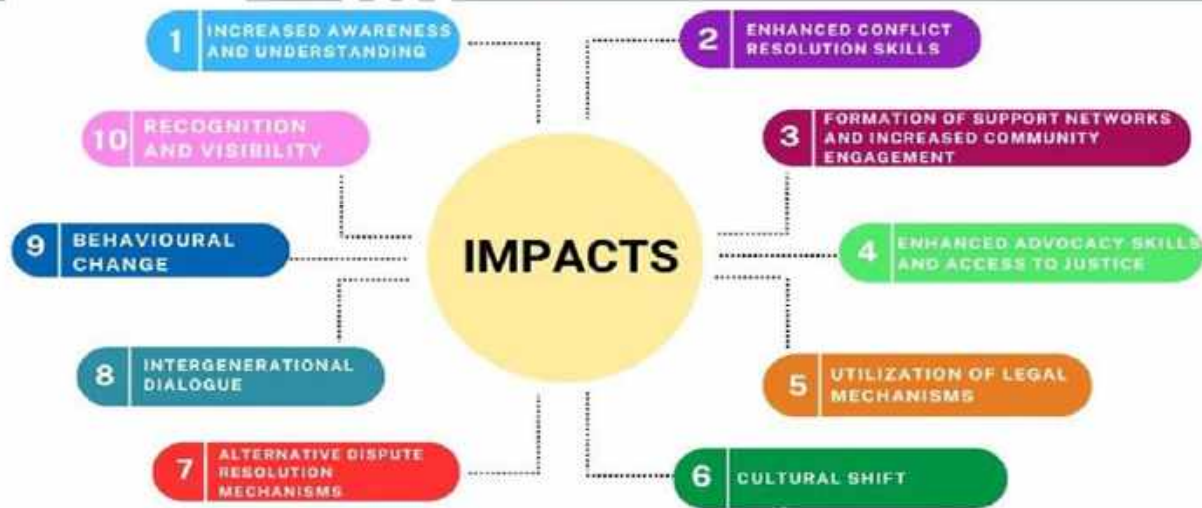

Income Generation Activities

SWATI has successfully promoted over 3000 Women Self-help Groups in Kandhamal, Khurdha, Ganjam, and Boudh districts through a variety of impactful activities, providing essential handholding support. 600 Women SHGs have been promoted in Bhubaneswar, Behampur, Phulabani, and Bouda municipal areas under the Deendayal Antyodaya Yojana-National Urban Livelihood Mission (DAY-NULM) program. Furthermore, the organization

has established 40 ward-level women SHG federations and 30 cluster-level federations in these areas. In Ganjam district, SWATI has successfully promoted over 100 Women SHGs through the Odisha Forestry Sector Development Program. Similarly, in Kandhamal district, more than 1500 Women SHGs have been formed and strengthened through various programs such as WADI, MMJIM, Millet Mission, Special program for promotion of integrated farming (SPPIF), and other livelihood-based programs. The organization has been consistently providing capacity building trainings and regular support for financial linkage, IGP planning, and the implementation of various Income Generation Activities.

Millet Mothers

SWATI is actively implementing the Odisha Millet Mission Program in Raikia and Tikabali block of Kandhamal district, with a strong focus on empowering women farmers. These women are at the forefront of various activities aimed at creating awareness about millet farming, encouraging seed storage and multiplication, sharing delicious millet recipes, establishing millet tiffin centers, and operating millet processing units. Over 30 women farmers have been identified as Millet Mothers to spearhead these initiatives in their respective villages.



Campaign to Stop Child Marriage

SWATI is actively leading a campaign against child marriage in the Kandhamal district. They are implementing various programs to educate girls about the harmful impacts of child marriage and provide them with essential life skills education. Additionally, SWATI is spearheading village-level campaigns against child marriage, while also working to promote and strengthen child protection committees at the panchayat level. Moreover, SWATI is providing crucial support to help girls start income-generating activities and offering essential health assistance.

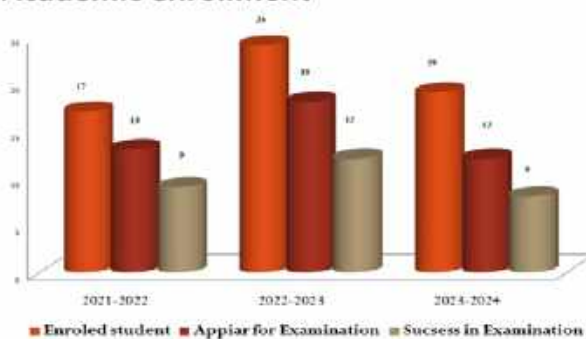
SWATI has been given priority for education of the community to strengthen their knowledge base and their informed decision-making ability. The Education objectives of the organisation is broadly divided into three parts - Institutional education, Awareness building and informative education and Skill based education. SWATI is managing an E-Library and Civil Service coaching Center at Phulbani town to provide study opportunity to students for competitive preparation and science park at Phulbani to increase scientific knowledge among students and guardians. For Skill based Education the Organisation has been arranging regular trainings and orientations for skill development.



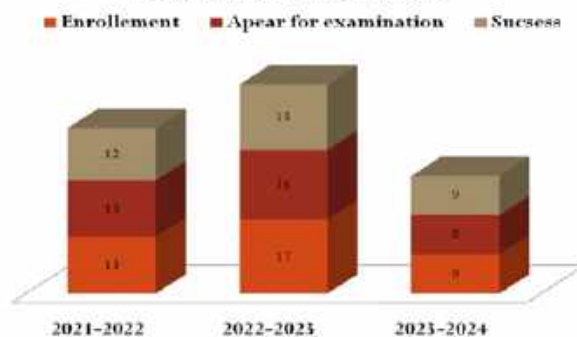
National Institute of Open Schooling

SWATI has established a Study Center under National Institute of Open Schooling (NIOS) at Bandhagada helping the dropout children gain access to formal education since 2011. In 2011 FVTRS started support to SWATI for opening the National Institute of Open Schooling (NIOS) center at Bandhagada accredited as AI-AVI-SLEID. Now NIOS is providing supports for Offline enrollment, registration for examination, study material distribution, personal contact programmes and conduct practical examination for Dropouts through Study center.

NIOS tries to create a friendly environment between student and facilitators for an easy learning process through different workshops and training programmes and tries to contact directly with the learners for smooth communication by issuing ID card till getting their certificate.



E-Library

The prime objective of District E- Library, Kandhamal is to create intellectual awakening among the students, academicians & all other readers and to provide ample scope for students, academicians & general readers to avail information in various subjects. This E-Library is established by ITDA Phulbani and Managed by SWATI.

The Library provides reading room facility having a book capacity of 5535 covering all the Major subjects of Humanities, Science Stream, Management, Self-Development etc. From E-Library, students able to access British library digital collection, Canada digital library, European union digital library, Library congress digital collection, National digital library of India, World digital library.



Students able to access Mock tests from reputed websites, Computer Practice test series for various competitive examinations available, Self paid online subscribed classes permitted to access. The Library also has another section containing periodicals, Magazines, Journals and News Papers. The Library contains an E-Library section having accommodating capacity of 10 users who can avail E- book.

With the help of E-Library, more than 100 tribal students have succeeded in various competitions and got employment opportunities in various fields. Here students are preparing for UPSC, NEET, JEE, Banking service and other corporate services. There are 947 Registered members of the Library including Annual, Half-yearly and Quarterly.

CIVIL SERVICE COACHING CENTRE



The District Administration, Kandhamal has established The Civil Service Coaching Center at Phulbani town and It is managed by SWATI. The primary goal of this initiative is to establish a conducive environment for Civil Service exam preparation within the Kandhamal District. Furthermore, it aims to offer abundant opportunities to local students, equipping them for success in Civil Service and various other government entrance examinations.

60 deserving aspirants from the district have been chosen through a combination of career marking and personal interviews for taking coaching.

On September 1, 2023, 14 Bharat Darshan Probationary IAS Officers visited to provide motivational sessions and clear doubts for aspirants.

On September 18, 2023, 5 Probationary OAS Officers visited to interact with and assist aspirants, addressing their doubts.

Miss M. Madhumita, IAS Sub Collector of Balliguda, conducted a motivational class on August 24, 2023.

On September 21, 2023, the Chairman Cum Collector & DM of Kandhamal led an interaction class and introduced additional measures for the convenience of aspirants.

SCIENCE PARK

SWATI is managing the Science Park at Phulbani town which is established to increase the scientific temperament among the students and parents. Here students are able to acquire knowledge of various science subjects with enjoyment on a daily basis. Similarly, various competitions are also held here for the parents and students. Different celebrations like international Yoga Day, World elders Day, Children's Day, Raja celebration and food festival, health competition are held here.

Swati has been giving priority in its programs to combat climate change and its impacts in Sustainable Development Goal-13 and to protect and conserve natural resources in SDG-15. Since its inception, the organisation has undertaken several programs linking natural resource management with community livelihoods development. The organisation has developed above 5000 hectares fallow land into productive and developed mango orchards and plantation of different tree species in 2000 hectares. Now Swati is implementing Odisha forest sector development program with 100 Vana Sanrakhyana Samitis of Ghumusar north forest division in Ganjam district.



Odisha Forestry Sector Development Project (Ama Jangala Yojana - OFSDP – Phase II)

The Ama Jangala Yojana scheme aims to achieve sustainable forest management in the project area through forest restoration initiatives along with providing income generating and livelihood opportunities to the forest dependent communities, so that the pressure on adjoining forest is relieved/reduced.

The main objectives of Ama Jangala Yojana Scheme are –

To conserve and restore degraded forests through forest restoration initiatives

To arrest further degradation of forests through participatory forest conservation and management strategy

To empower forest dependent communities by building their capacity to participate in the sustainable forest management

To improve the livelihood opportunities of the forest dependent communities so as to reduce their dependence on forests.

SWATI has been implementing this programme with 100 VSSs and 300 SHGs in 4 FMUs – Mujagada, Jagannath Prasad, Tarasing and Central, coming under the Ghumushar North Forest Division in Ganjam district.



Achievements of this Year

In the Tarasing Forest Management Unit area, 104 hectares of new plantation work has been completed, and maintenance activities have been carried out in a 1114-hectare plantation area. A total of 8000 Cashew, 8000 Eucalyptus, and 1000 mango plants have been successfully planted through the Farm Forestry program. Additionally, 160 households have planted

8161 Cashew plants on their 23 hectares of land, and 121 beneficiaries have received support to plant on their 43 hectares of land.

In the Jagannath Prasad FMU area, plantation work has been successfully completed on 207 hectares of land. A total of 27 women SHGs and 345 individual beneficiaries have been provided with a substantial amount of 40.75 lakh rupees for various income generation activities. This support has enabled 10 families to engage in fishery, 2 families in poultry farming, 18 families in vegetable farming, 16 families in cashew plantation, 7 families in dairy farming, 97 families in gottary, 31 families in honey bee farming, 30 families in leaf plate making, 4 families in mushroom cultivation, one person in cycle repairing, 11 families in running grocery shops, 17 families in paddy cultivation, 10 families in paper plate making, 87 families in backyard poultry, 2 persons in running stationary shops, 19 persons in sweet corn farming, 48 families in vermicompost, and 198 families in vegetable cultivation. Additionally, families have received support for agricultural implements, small irrigation, land development, farm pond construction, gottary support, and solar-based water pumps through convergence with different departments. Furthermore, infrastructural development activities such as the construction of community halls, pond renovation and stair construction, common bathrooms, crematoriums, and Anganwadi centers have been successfully carried out through convergence activities. The SHGs have been provided with rice hullers, grinders, dal processing machines, spice making machines, sound systems, generators, and other equipment to support their income-generating activities.

In the Central FMU area, a total of 105 Self-Help Groups (SHGs) and 895 individual beneficiaries have directly benefited from various project activities. The SHGs have actively engaged in a diverse range of Income Generation Program (IGP) activities, while the Farmers' groups have

demonstrated a strong commitment to advancing agricultural development activities. A substantial sum of 50.65 lakh rupees has been allocated to support the families and groups in both farm and non-farm livelihood development initiatives. Additionally, farmers have been provided with essential support such as seeds, plants, and agricultural





implements through strategic partnerships with line departments. Furthermore, SHGs have been equipped with cutting-edge processing machines through Mission Shakti, while village infrastructure development works have been efficiently executed by the Panchayatiraj Department, and water supply has been effectively managed through RWSS.

In the Mujagada FMU area, the Village development works have been successfully implemented through convergence. This includes the installation of 7 solar-based drinking water points in 7 villages, as well as the construction of goat sheds, poultry night shelters, and other vital infrastructure. Additionally, 74 out of a total of 115 self-help groups (SHGs) have been effectively linked with banks for loan assistance. These SHGs are actively involved in various income-generating

activities, such as poultry farming, duck rearing, honey bee farming, and pisciculture. Furthermore, a significant 52.2 hectares of land has been successfully utilized for plantation work through farm forestry.

IMPACT of the PROJECT

This initiative has successfully organized the community to protect the natural forest through Joint Forest Management process and empowered the villagers to enhance their forest-based livelihood by effectively managing and safeguarding the forest.

The development of infrastructure such as roads, drinking water facilities, electricity, and other construction projects has significantly improved village life.

Agricultural developmental activities and support have elevated the income levels of families, ensuring food and nutrition security.

The income generation activities facilitated by women's Self-Help Groups (SHGs) have not only increased their income and savings, but also strengthened their relationships with local authorities, banks, and other institutions, enhancing their decision-making power. These SHGs are now actively representing themselves in various platforms and participating in district and state-level exhibitions.

Capacity building activities have bolstered community-based organizations and raised awareness about government provisions and citizen rights.

The forest-based livelihoods such as leaf plate making, broom making, and the collection of Non-Timber Forest Products (NTFPs) and forest foods have significantly supported impoverished families in earning their livelihoods.

SWATI is steadfast in its efforts to establish social harmony and justice. The Organization has been actively involved in Antaranga programs for social cohesion and peacebuilding in Kandhamal district, engaging the youth in social development and peacekeeping. Additionally, youth organizations have been established in the villages through the Bharat Nirmana program, participating in various social service and developmental activities. Furthermore, SWATI has been organizing regular blood donation camps in association with Sambad- Ama Odisha and observing different national and international memorable days to raise awareness about their importance within the community.



SWEEKRUTI

PROMOTION OF TRANSGENDER EQUALITY & JUSTICE

The Social Security and Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (SSEPD) Department, Government of Odisha recognizes that Transgender Persons are valuable human resource for the society and seeks to create an environment that provides them equal opportunities, protection of their rights and full participation in society. As part of an integrated initiative for Transgender Equality & Justice the Department has launched this new umbrella scheme "SWEEKRUTI" to be operated in a mission mode with manifold objectives.

SWATI is working as the facilitating NGO for the District Kandhamal, Boudh and Subarnapur to implement the SWEEKRUTI Scheme.

AIM and Objectives of the Project

To ensure equitable justice for transgender persons the Sweekruti scheme focuses on the following broad objectives:

To create an enabling environment to ensure equal opportunities, equity, social justice & empowerment of transgender persons of the state.

To encourage voluntary action and participation of all stake holders for ensuring effective social integration of transgender persons.



To expand outreach activities for protection of rights and entitlements of transgender persons in the state.

To promote individual and group endeavours by transgender persons for employment, self-employment and other socio-educational services.

To strengthen the existing implementation machinery and create facilities for coverage of all transgender persons of the state.

Project Highlights

SWATI has successfully identified 98 transgender individuals in Kandhamal district, 30 in Boudh District, and 48 in Subarnapur District. The Organisation has issued identity cards to 76 individuals in Kandhamal, 24 in Boudh, and 28 in Subarnapur. The Organization's efforts also include providing essential counseling, behavior therapy, and socialization support to the transgender community.

SWATI has organized camps to address issues and rights concerning the transgender community. It has taken proactive steps to promote the empowerment of transgender individuals by establishing seven self-help groups across three districts.

Moreover, SWATI has facilitated skill mapping and provided skill up gradation training to enable transgender individuals to engage in income-generating activities. For instance, in Kandhamal district, individuals have been trained in Phenyl production, tailoring, driving, mushroom production, and poultry farming. Similar training has been provided in Boudh and Subarnapur districts as well.

IMPACT of the PROJECT

This program has created hope and confidence among Transgender persons on social security and personal development.

The transgender persons are aware about their constitutional and legal rights through orientation camps and workshops. Formation of their groups have been empowered them to place their issues and strengthen them to protest the social exploitations.

The capacity building trainings and income generation activities have provided alternative income source and employment to them.





SWATI has an extensive portfolio of published books, covering a wide range of themes and success interventions. It has published books on Livelihood, Health, Child marriage prevention, Child education initiative, Corona prevention initiatives, traditional farming practices of Kandhamal farmers, Millet Farming and many more. In addition, SWATI has produced posters, brochures, and leaflets on various important topics such as MGNREGS, FRA and PESA, Malaria, AIDs, Environment, and Swachha Bharat Abhiyan. Handbooks on Jangala Jami Adhikar (Odia) have also been published, along with public education materials on MGNREGS, Mother and Child health, and Women's rights.

SWATI has also created Audio-Visual Documentaries on crucial subjects including MGNREGS, Agriculture, DBI, Tribal Development, WADI, Hydro Project, Maternal Newborn Child health and Nutrition, Malaria, Mental Health, HIV/AIDs, and Transgender Issues. In addition, SWATI has developed an audio CD on various development themes. To ensure effective dissemination of information, SWATI has established panchayat level information centers and public libraries at Paburia, Bandhagada, and Phulbani. Furthermore, the organization maintains an up-to-date [website www.swatiodisha.org](http://www.swatiodisha.org) featuring detailed information about its programs, activities, reports, and initiatives.

These financial statements are the responsibility of the entities management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.




